G I G I A N D P L S : O R G E N E R A L G R A N T S A N D P A S T O R A L L E A D E R S H I P

Most workplaces develop an internal code, a series of abbreviations and acronyms used to save keystrokes and syllables, which often serve to confuse and exclude outsiders. The Louisville Institute, and our colleagues in the Religion Division of Lilly Endowment, Inc. are no exception. A typical email message might read: "Does MM know that a fellow PWG¹ member is going to FTE?"

(Translation: Have you told Louisville Institute board member Michael Mooty, senior minister of Central Christian Church in Lexington, KY, that Ann Svennungsen – who along with Michael and ten other pastors and priests formed the first Pastors Working Group – is to be the new president of the Fund for Theological Education?)

As a relatively new member of the Institute staff I realized I needed to quickly master not only our jargon (SGPL – Sabbatical Grants for Pastoral Leaders, CF&L – Christian Faith and Life, etc.) but that of our parent organization in Indianapolis (LEI – Lilly Endowment, Inc.), and a host of programs and initiatives launched or supported by the Endowment. "TEV" is not a translation of

the Bible but the *theological exploration of vocation*. "Diss" is not an act or attitude of disrespect, but an Institute program to help graduate students in religion to complete their theses, *Dissertation Fellowships*.

Which brings us to *GiGi and PLs*, neither an old musical nor a new band, but General Grants for pastoral leaders. One of the most important opportunities made available to pastoral and academic leaders by the Louisville Institute is the General Grants program. Since 1990 the Institute has awarded \$7,890,000 through this program for a wide range of projects of research, writing, and convening. The grants are made by the Louisville Institute Board at its thrice-yearly meeting, in consultation with Institute staff. During the last decade the General Grants program has evolved to encompass the full range of areas in which the Institute has interest, growing alongside of and in support of other initiatives. While many early grants focused on sociological and historical research, more recent grants have been

FIRST BOOK GRANT PROGRAM FOR MINORITY SCHOLARS

The Louisville Institute's newest grant program is our First Book Grant Program for Minority Scholars. Over the years, the Louisville Institute has convened several consultations of younger African-American and Hispanic scholars. In virtually every one of those events, we heard from participants about the distinctive challenges they face in connection with the tenure process. All too often such scholars are asked to assume a heavy set of institutional responsibilities that can make it difficult to complete the scholarly work necessary to secure tenure. But, if the American religion academy is to reflect the increasing racial and ethnic diversity of the United States, it is essential that the number of tenured minority professors continue to increase.

In response, the Louisville Institute designed this grant program to enable junior, non-tenured religion scholars of color to spend an entire academic year devoted to that research project while free of other professional responsibilities. In keeping with its fundamental mission, the Louisville Institute is especially interested in identifying and supporting scholars of color who seek through their academic work to be in conversation with church leaders and to

strengthen their faith communities.

Consequently, applications are judged on both the intellectual quality of the research and writing project and its potential contribution to the vitality of North American Christianity.

We were encouraged by the many good applications submitted in the first year of this new grant program, and we were able to award grants to three fine scholars as noted elsewhere in this issue. We look forward to another strong group of applications during the coming academic year. A L U M N E W S

Dr. John Stackhouse (General Grant 2000) Christianity Today (June 2003) named his book, "Humble Apologetics," one of their Books of the Year.

John P. Bartkowski (Dissertation Fellowship 1996, Summer Stipend 1998 & 2000) published "Charitable Choices: Religion, Race, and Poverty in the Post-Welfare Era" and "The Promise Keepers: Servants, Soldiers, and Godly Men" (available this fall).

Dr. Mark Newman (Dissertation Fellowship 1992) published his revised dissertation as "Getting Right with God: Southern Baptists and Desegregation, 1945-1995." It has won the 2002 Lillian Smith Book Award for Nonfiction, the 2002 American Studies Network Book Prize, and the 2002 Anne B. and James B. McMillan Prize.

SABBATICAL GRANTS FOR PASTORAL LEADERS

The Louisville Institute's Sabbatical Grant for Pastoral Leaders (SGPL) program is entering a second decade of providing grants to support six, eight, and twelve week sabbaticals for the personal and vocational renewal of religious leaders employed full time in a recognized position of pastoral leadership. Building on the wisdom of a successful SGPL Consultation in February, and on the strength of a thirty-two percent increase in applications for the 2002 SGPL competition, the Louisville Institute has planned only minor changes for 2003.

The most notable change is moving the date when sabbaticals may begin, from January 1 to March 1 so that all grantees can participate in the annual SGPL Consultation *before* beginning the sabbatical. Consequently, successful applicants in the 2003 SGPL competition will take their sabbaticals between March 1, 2004 and August 31, 2005.

While the emphasis continues to be on renewal, the Institute also hopes to see evidence of significant study and reflection during the sabbatical period. To suggest possible areas of reflection, the following questions might be considered:

• **Spiritual Practices** – What are the distinctive spiritual practices vital to Christian faith and life, and how may they be best cultivated for sustaining Christian ministry?

• **Pastoral Imagination** – How does the ongoing encounter with scripture, theology, and tradition nurture the pastoral imagination necessary for a flourishing pastoral ministry?

• **Worship** – How may churches create and adapt patterns of Christian worship that meaningfully engage successive generations of believers and seekers while remaining faithful to Christian tradition?

• **Changing face of ministry** – How may pastoral leaders renew their vocations and sustain their gifts in response to the ever-increasing pace of change in the life of the Church and the expectations of ministry?

The staff of the Louisville Institute always welcomes your questions about the SGPL program. Remember, however, that because of the large number of proposals we expect to receive, it is not possible to grant extensions to the deadline. Completed applications must be postmarked by September 15, 2003.

2002-03 Competitive Grant Program Grantees

The Louisville Institute divides its grantmaking work into a General Grant program and six competitive grant programs that are more specific in terms of those who are eligible to apply and preferred project topics. But all of these grantmaking programs seek to support those who are committed to the revitalization of American Christianity and its institutions.

The last issue of *Intersections* listed those pastors and other religious leaders who received grants in our Sabbatical Grants for Pastoral Leaders Program. In this issue, we wish to highlight the grantees who were selected to receive a grant during the 2003-04 academic year in one of our other five competitive grant programs. These programs, and their basic purposes, are as follows:

The Christian Faith and Life Sabbatical Grants Program supports sabbatical research projects designed to make more accessible to religious believers the themes of Christian faith in relation to the realities of their contemporary lives.

The Dissertation Fellowships Program supports the final year of Ph.D. or Th.D. dissertation writing for students engaged in research on American religion.

The First Book Grant Program for Minority Scholars assists junior, non-tenured religion scholars of color to complete a major research project on an issue in American Christianity related to the priorities of the Louisville Institute. (See additional article in this issue.)

The Religious Institutions Grants Program supports research projects designed to encourage reflection on the nature of and challenges to religious organizations and institutions in the contemporary world.

The Summer Stipend Program supports faculty members engaged in summer research projects and is intended to support ten weeks of research and writing. Preference is given to proposals that address the current program priorities of the Louisville Institute: Christian faith and life, religious institutions, and pastoral leadership.

spread broadly between proposals reflecting the Institute's interest in Religious Institutions, Christian Faith and Life, and Pastoral Leadership.

But we have not made as many grants in direct research or support of pastoral leadership as we would like. Two reasons may account for this – pastoral leaders are not aware that they are eligible for General Grants, to support writing projects, peer study/reflection/support groups, convening around critical topics, etc.; and academic and other researchers may be unclear on the particular topics around pastoral leadership for which seek proposals.

Consider this, then, an invitation: the staff and board of the Louisville Institute encourage pastoral leaders to submit letters of inquiry about potential General Grants, and encourage researchers and others to inquire about projects in support of and/or in partnership with pastoral leaders. You may do so by sending a “letter of inquiry,” no more than two pages, describing the project you have in mind, how it fits within the priorities of the Louisville Institute, the level of funding you seek, and how you will use those funds.

We look forward to hearing from you.

BOOKS RELATED TO LOUISVILLE INSTITUTE GRANTS

Many of the grants made by the Louisville Institute over the years have supported projects of research and writing that have resulted in the publication of books and articles. Some of these have been conducted by scholars based in colleges, universities, and seminaries, while others have been conducted by pastors and leaders in other religious institutions. To date, at least 126 books directly associated with Louisville Institute grants have been published. In this issue of *Intersections*, we list all those that have come to our attention to date. We will publish a list of project-related articles in a future issue.

Now, a request and a claim. First, the request—if you have published a book supported directly by a grant from the Louisville Institute that does not appear on this list, we would love to hear about that fact. In fact, we would appreciate receiving three copies of it, one of which will remain in the Institute office with the other two going to the Lilly Endowment, our parent institution.

Now for the claim. As I look over this lengthy list of books, I am impressed by several things. First, I am struck by the broad range of topics concerning American religious life, including some that are more academic and others that are more pastoral or devotional.

Some are densely written, academic contributions to a variety of contemporary scholarly discussions about American religion. Others, while written for a more general readership, also have much to contribute to these discussions and should be widely read. Second, these books reflect a multi-generational authorship. Some authors have long been major authorities in their fields, pastors of influential churches, and so forth. But other books listed here represent young and first-time authors from whom we expect to hear for a long time to come. Finally, while a few of these books have received national acclaim and won major publishing awards, others have been read and discussed more selectively. But virtually all of them represent serious grappling with issues of real importance for American religious life. Taken collectively, they represent a rich resource for those who care about the present and the future of churches in North America. Happy reading!
